ABBEY RUINS HARD HAT TOURS



The first of this year's openings of the Abbey Ruins was on Friday 9 May. This was a great success, with 72 visitors over the two-hour lunchtime period. Four FORA volunteers supported Reading Museum staff in guiding the tours. FORA leaflets were handed out to attendees, and we have had two new members so far — one of whom said it was the best lunch hour he'd ever had! It was indeed a pleasure to be inside the Ruins again.

The next opening is on Saturday 14 June, to coincide with **Reading's Water Fest**. This time the visits will run between 11.00am and 3.00pm. FORA volunteers will again be joining Museum staff to act as guides. We will also have a presence at the Museum display stand in Chestnut Walk. The tours are free, and last around 15 minutes. You may have to queue to join a tour, as only a limited number of people can be allowed in at any one time. Assemble at the entrance in Chestnut Walk. Wear sensible shoes.

Do come along and join a tour and say hello to us at the Museum stand.

The Ruins will also be opened to the public (under controlled conditions), during the **Heritage Weekend** in mid-September 2014. These will be longer tours of the Abbey Quarter. Keep an eye on the Reading Museum website for further details, including timings and how you can book your tour slot.

We want to work with Reading Museum to increase the frequency of these controlled openings of the Abbey Ruins in 2015. Our new publicity leaflet has attracted so much interest that we have had to reprint it! Which leads me finally to say, that we are delighted to welcome several new members of the Friends. Our membership now stands at over one hundred, which is a great advance on last year and an extremely encouraging development (though we still have some way to go if we are to achieve our goal of doubling the membership by our AGM in October – so do carry on encouraging your friends to become our Friends!)
