On the topic of St James, it is widely believed that the burial site of Henry I lies either beneath or behind the nursery school attached to the church. Philippa Langley (who inaugurated the successful project to find the lost grave of Richard III), has shown interest in initiating a search for the burial site of this royal founder of Reading Abbey.

Preliminary talks have taken place with Reading Borough Council and

the RC Diocese of Portsmouth, attended by representatives from Friends of Reading Abbey and Friends of Reading Museums.

The Hidden Abbey project has subsequently attracted national media interest, following an article in the June edition of the BBC History Magazine.

We will continue to monitor any developments.

ABBEY QUARTER UPDATE



There has been a lot of activity in developing the next fundraising application to the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for the for the Reading Abbey Revealed project. The project was successful in June 2014 in getting Stage 1 funding, which is being used to develop the Stage 2 bid, to be submitted in September 2015. A final decision from HLF is expected by Christmas.

During February a specialist buildings archaeologist was examining the Abbey Ruins, to interpret the existing standing remains and identify significant surviving features or evidence of the Abbey Church buildings. The core remains of the South Transept, Chapter House and Dormitory are still able to give clues as to how the former abbey may have looked. From this on-site work the archaeologist has developed a fuller picture of how these areas of the Abbey may have looked in their original form. The work also provides suggestions as to what happened to the Abbey after it was dissolved; including the damage caused the ruins during the Civil War. The results of these findings will form part of the conservation plan being prepared for the second round application to the HLF.

In addition, Julia Holberry Associates have been developing an activity and interpretation plan. A second online survey was run in January 2015, which was completed by 1,053 people. The consultants also spoke to key stakeholders, including FORA; and held public consultation exercises. The results revealed that:

- 99.5% of people either agreed or strongly agreed that the Abbey Ruins and Abbey Gate were an important part of Reading's History and Identity.
- Local people (99.6%) and schools (98.8%) should have the opportunity to learn more about its history.
- Respondents were keen to learn more about the lives of monks and ordinary townspeople (95%) as well as royal and famous visitors (87%).
- People wanted to learn about the Abbey Ruins through a variety of ways including new signage and information panels, guided or self-guided tours, a new exhibition in Reading Museum, talks, and open-air theatre and events in the Ruins.
- Over half of the people that responded (57%), expressed an interest in volunteering with the project. The information collected from the survey will be used to inform the Council's Stage 2 bid to HLF.
