Back again for its 35th year, Water Fest celebrates the Kennet and Avon Canal, as well as the many historic spots that can be found along the towpath in Reading.

Reading Abbey was founded by monks from Cluny Abbey in France, and Lewes Priory, Cluny's daughter house in England. The Friends subscribe to the Federation of European Cluniac Sites (FESC), which was set up in 1994 to promote awareness of Cluniac foundations across Europe.

This year, to celebrate the Federation's 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary, we will focus our display on the Abbey's connections with Cluny; and there will be our *Cluny Kids* History Trail for children to follow.

We will visit the cathedral and have a guided tour of the Blackfriars Dominican friary in the city centre. The cathedral is the C12<sup>th</sup> church of the Benedictine Abbey which survived the dissolution to become the seat of the new see of Gloucester. It is the burial place of a king - Edward II - and retains much of its monastic cloister, including fan vaulting and a Reservoir.

## **READING GAOL UPDATE**

Our Summer 2023 edition featured the Save Reading Gaol Campaign, when 700 people marched through Reading on 25 March 23 in a bid to save the building as a cultural centre and to prevent luxury flats being built on this historical site.

One year further on, the site has been sold to the Ziran Foundation and during an interview with Radio Berkshire in March 2024, Eric Sun, Media Relations Manager for Ziran stated that the foundation had "no intention" of turning the building into flats. Mr Sun further announced that the two main focuses were a boutique hotel and a substantial art gallery and that the Ziran Foundation were 100% on board with making the site a landmark/cultural destination.
